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Rev. Carol Cook Moore Northern Prairie District Superintendent

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Rev. Carol Cook Moore has been announced as the next superintendent in the Northern Prairie District. She will fill the role currently held by Rev. Tish Malloy, who will be appointed to lead the Crossroads District as Rev. Rockford Johnson returns to the pastorate to lead Norman-McFarlin.

"Carol Cook Moore's knowledge of the personnel processes of the church have equipped her to serve effectively on the district," the bishop said in his announcement.

Cook Moore is the pastor at Alva-First and the chair of the Board of Ordained Ministry. Her service in the Oklahoma Conference dates back to 1984. She earned a bachelor's degree from Oklahoma City University in 1980, a master's degree from Saint Paul School of Theology in 1984, and a doctoral degree from Drew Theological Seminary in 2009. Over her ministry career, she has served four churches, the Northeastern State University Wesley Foundation, and the Wesley Theological Seminary as an assistant professor of worship and preaching. She said she is humbled by the opportunity, even in light of the uncertainties facing the denomination.

"I think every pastor needs to ask, 'what is essential?' I think we're getting there pretty darn quick with this pandemic," Cook Moore said. "What is essential to me is to keep the standard before myself, to treat everyone with dignity, to listen, and to seek compassion in whatever discernment and decisions are before me individually, are before the cabinet, before the conference, the general church."

On June 20<sup>th</sup> of last year, Seth and I left our home in Pauls Valley for our new adventure in Ponca City, Oklahoma. There is always uncertainty when starting a new appointment. We found out late in the process and I must admit we were a bit in shock that we were moving. Our visit with the SPRC committee to visit the church and parsonage a few weeks earlier took place during a flood. Some members of the committee couldn't get to the church due to roads being blocked off. The weeks leading up to our move, I was doing both my job and my secretary's at Pauls Valley since she had surgery complications. We had less than a month to pack both my office and our home. The night before picking up our U-Haul, a massive storm hit with hurricane force winds that knocked out electricity for the community and left us in a bind. All the food we had in the refrigerator and freezer was ruined and we sweltered during the day and were in the dark at night. This was not a smooth move at all. When we pulled up at the parsonage in Ponca City that afternoon, we were probably not in the best mental state but nevertheless excited about new possibilities.

Even with the challenges that accompanied our move last year,

our first year at First Church has been such a blessing even though it, like our move, has been filled with challenges. I believe God has accomplished much in our short time together regardless of obstacles that we have faced. First, the people of this congregation are tremendous. We have so many spiritually sound disciples who make ministry a pleasure for any pastor or church staff. I have found a desire within our church family to grow and move forward. Many congregations are downsizing and just trying to hold on if they can, but I truly believe this church has her best days ahead. We will have to be proactive and be willing to leave our comfort zone to reach those hurting in Ponca City, but I believe the Holy Spirit is already paving the way for us to accomplish much for the kingdom. Are you excited about our church's future?

When you inherit a staff, you never know what to expect. I have discovered that First Church is blessed to have wonderful staff of Christian ministers leading all aspects of our church and worship life. Joycelynn Davidson and Sue Lippert bring such beauty and flair to the music of our worship. Cathie Gilliland does such a tremendous job of connecting with our children and helping them grow as young disciples. Heather Kubik and Lindsey McGee have brought new life and enthusiasm to our youth program. Cynthia Wilson is the finest church business manager I've been blessed to know. Dianne Clark is our information hub and does a great job with the bulletin, the monthly Flame and other outreach instruments. Ruth Harbeson and her awesome staff keep the Mother's Day Out running at peak efficiency and bless so many families. Larry Davidson keeps our facilities clean and in tip top shape. Larry also has voluntarily manned

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the video/sound ministry of our church and has gone above and beyond leading that important department. I have been so blessed with our staff. If you appreciate the people I have mentioned, why not take a moment to tell them thank you.

Now for the obstacles we have faced. I think our Ministry Teams that were formed in early fall have done a great job so far. We spent time reintroducing our church to our community and looked for ways to help us connect with those within our church family. We had just begun the careful process of evaluating our church ministries when it all came to a dead stop. The Corona virus hit First Church and hit us hard and shutting down for several months was devastating to the momentum we were building. We tragically lost a beloved church member to the virus and saw it devastate many more. When I was so sick, you brought us food and helped us in so many ways. I received messages, cards, and calls and those sustained me when I was at my lowest point. What a testimony to the members and staff of First Church. I know that our other members with this virus experienced the same love and support. It makes me sad for those in Ponca City who do not know Jesus or have a church family to lean on.

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Choral leaders sound the alarm about the fate of choirs after COVID-19

With coronavirus lockdown putting a ban on large gatherings, the joy of singing in a choir is being forgotten. We must not let our great tradition die, say choral leaders **Bob Chilcott and John Rut**ter.

"Singing in a choir is not only about communality, social cohesion and harmony; for many it is an essential source of emotional wellbeing and positive mental health.

"It is a powerful expression of our culture and humanity, and it cannot be allowed to fade away."

Since coronavirus restrictions were lifted in June, members of the public can now visit any type of shop and restaurant, and engage in outdoor attractions, from drive-in cinemas to zoos and safari parks. We need the church government and American Choral Director's Association to show us how we can restart singing together on an equal footing with opening theme parks, shopping and kicking a football around.

It's impossible to know the exact number of choirs in the US, much less the world. Many churches have choirs, most high schools and colleges have choirs, there are professional choirs who sing with orchestras and opera companies and there are community choirs all across the country who sing just because they love it. All of these singers are mourning the loss of singing together.

Schools and churches alike are scrambling to find a way for music to stay alive in our education and worship. Zoom has filled a gap, but it doesn't replace actually singing together. And online worship will never be the same as worshiping together in community.

Music Notes

The problem with traditional online worship is the fact that the music never seems to sound as good as it does live. The very nature of classical/sacred music coming from a pipe organ, grand piano, classically trained singer or instrumentalist is... they were never designed to be amplified or manipulated by a microphone! And when someone sticks a mic in front of them, one immediately loses the richness and fullness of that instrument, and the accompanying reverberations of the room. And much of the subtleties of tone and musicianship are now controlled by the person at the sound board. Larry has done an outstanding job of getting our worship out to you at home and ment to be "alert to the consequences of our choir's continued silence" and "proactive in ensuring music-making can return to our churches", adding that we need to "safeguard our choral tradition."

The revised guidance on singing from the CDC now states only that faith-based organizations should: "Promote social distancing at services and other gatherings, ensuring that clergy, staff, choir, volunteers and attendees at the services follow social distancing, as circumstances and faith traditions allow, to lessen their risk." But our guidelines from the UM church have not changed.

Until we are cleared through the UMC or medical research leading to a vaccine, singing will continue to be considered a leading cause of spreading COVID-19. You have seen me singing from the Lectern without a mask and may wonder about that. I have had the virus and have tested positive for antibodies in my system. So for now, still keeping a 20' distance in mind, I am singing. I hope in the near future,

you will be singing with me. Until then, keep a song Lift up in your heart and know that I will continue to search Hearts for ways to include music in our worship services.

communities and with the help of missionaries organize congregations and churches in what came to be known as Oklahoma.

In what was then the Indian Mission Conference, Methodists offered a Christian ministry sensitive to the languages and cultures of more than 30 tribes. The 1972 General Conference acknowledged the importance of the Indian Mission Conference and designated it the Oklahoma Indian Missionary Conference (OIMC) with "the same rights and powers as an annual conference."

Today the OIMC continues to minister to the needs of Indian people. The present membership is approximately 6,000 with 84 churches, several of these congregations being over 100 years old, five fellowships and a Church & Community center. Oklahoma is home to the majority of our con-
